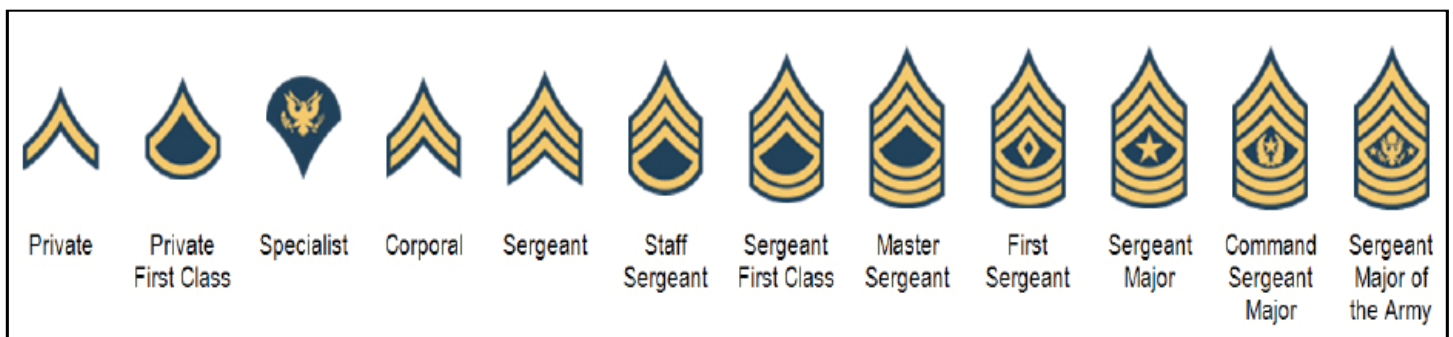

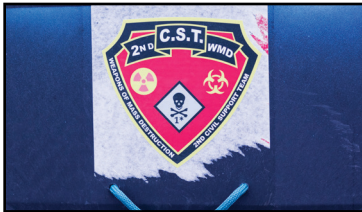
Responding to chemical, biological, radiological, nuclear and explosive (CBRNE) incidents is one of the few unique capabilities that the military can offer to support state and local authorities inside the borders of the United States. Likewise, the National Guard is well trained, equipped and located to provide this service during an event that exceeds the capability of state and local agencies.

This summer, the headquarters of the 369 Sustainment Brigade and the 133 Composite Supply Company will assume a unique and valuable mission: Command and Control CBRNE Response Element- Bravo or

C2CRE-B. This mission is an integral part of the Nation's overall disaster response plan designed to respond anywhere in the United States to a CBRNE incident.

The C2CRE is a portion of the total Department of Defense response continuum outlined in Joint Publication 3-28, which is organized and funded by US Northern Command and US Army North. The structure starts with local Civil Support Teams (WMD) and progresses to CERF-P and HRF forces, and eventually to the C2CRE if the incident is destructive enough and covers a large enough area.

Under the current structure, the 369 headquarters would act as Task Force Operations providing command and control to CBRNE, search and rescue, medical support and other direct response units. The 133



would act as a support element under Task Force Logistics, providing material and sustainment support to units responding to such an event. The mission of C2CRE-B is commanded by Task Force 46 of the Michigan Army National Guard and is composed of several different units from states including Illinois, Iowa and New Jersey.



In May, the C2CRE will be validated for their two-year-long mission during the Guardian Response exercise at the Mascatauck Urban Training Center, Camp Atterbury, Indiana. During this exercise, the units will deploy and respond to a simulated CBRNE event and be evaluated by US Army Forces Command (FORSCOM), 1st US Army and US Army North. After this training and evaluation period, the units will be ready to deploy and respond to any CBRNE incident nation-wide.

With C2CRE, Guardian Response, JRTC rotations, Diamond Saber, Saber Junction, and Shared Accord, we will have a busy summer ahead of us. We have been getting in IDT / AT projections, please continue to send these for the remainder of the fiscal year to ensure mission success for all units.



As we approach this busy time of year, we must be aware of the significant damage that flooding has caused in the past in the Lake Ontario region, in particular: JOA 4 and 5.

We have civil support operations supporting the high-risk areas working alongside NYS civil authorities.

We must ensure all Soldiers involved in the response have required OCIE and PPE. When leaders recognize a shortfall in equipment, it's imperative that requests are sent as soon as they are recognized.



We want to highlight the fact that the CIF Discharge Report has been reported at 0 for the past three months. Supply personnel are working hard to make sure property accountability is high on their priority list. These efforts directly lead to a cost savings for the government and a better trained and ready force. Great Job!

Commonly known as “JAGs,” judge advocates represent the command in various administrative, investigative, and punitive settings where Soldiers are named respondents. While they advise and assist commanders with preserving military morale, good order, and discipline, judge advocates also provide legal assistance to individual Soldiers.

Are you getting reimbursed for MTA EZ Pass Tolls?



If not, you could be losing hundreds of dollars per year! In August 2017, the TAG issued an MTA EZ Pass reimbursement policy for all Soldiers traveling to and from their duty location.

Reimbursement is easy! Here's the procedure to get reimbursed:

First: Print out a monthly statement of E-Z Pass activity, circle and number the trips associated with official military duties.

Second: Get a TBTA ticket from your supply sergeant for each trip.

Third: Draft a quick letter stating the following:

“I am a service member in the NY National Guard and as such I am entitled to pass free through all toll-gates and tunnels and over all toll-bridges while in the performance of my official military duties pursuant to NYSML Section 237. I have reviewed, circled, and numbered the charges incurred on my EZ Pass that were in the course of my official military duties. I have attached or included a TBTA bar-coded pass for each circled and numbered trip. I affirm under penalty of perjury and false official statement that the highlighted charges were incurred in the course of my official military duties. I have attached a copy of the EZ Pass statement hereto. Please credit my EZ pass account.”

Fourth: Send your monthly statement, letter and the appropriate number of TBTA tickets to:

Your E-ZPass account will be credited within 30 to 60 days!

Keep in mind... you must use your OWN PERSONAL E-Z PASS tag. Reimbursement is not authorized to E-Z pass accounts which are not in your name.

Soldier Spotlight

SGT Janna Enyart



“Being able to see the inner workings of how Russian linguists work at the United Nations was a once in a lifetime opportunity.”

Sgt. Janna Enyart, a full-time AGR in the G1, assisted in the first interagency Russian Linguist Immersion class at the United Nations in New York City.

The class brought together approximately 25 Russian linguist students and instructors from the U.S. Agency for International Development, Department of Defense, and Department of State, to increase the interoperability between the different offices. The participants were able to hone their Russian language

skills by conducting real-world key leader engagements across the academic, diplomatic, and municipal communities in New York City.

“I WOULD TELL ALL GUARDSMEN THAT KNOW A SECOND LANGUAGE TO TAKE THE DLPT TEST TO SEE WHERE THEY STAND, BECAUSE YOU NEVER KNOW WHAT OPPORTUNITIES ARE OUT THERE.”

“This was a great opportunity to see the works of the linguistic departments across all the different agencies, and network with other colleagues” said Enyart. “Being able to see the inner workings of how Russian linguists work at the United Nations was a once in a lifetime opportunity.”



The class gave the students and instructors the opportunity to visit landmarks across New York City such as the United Nations Headquarters, Federal Reserve Bank of New York, United States Holocaust Memorial Museum, and different Eastern European embassies. During her visit to the Federal Reserve, Enyart translated the tour to the other students in Russian and Ukrainian.

Enyart received top scores on the [Defense Language Proficiency Test \(DLPT\)](#) in both Russian and

Ukrainian. The DLPT is used by the Department of Defense and other military divisions to assess your reading and listening proficiency in a foreign language.

Soldiers who perform well can receive a Foreign Language Proficiency Bonus ranging from \$100 to \$500 per month on their drill check.

Exercise **Dynamic Front 2019**

Grafenwoehr, Germany



In MAR 2019, the 53d DLD joined approximately 3,200 participants from 27 nations in exercise Dynamic Front 19. It provided an intense, realistic environment that takes advantage of US Army Europe and 7th Army Training Command's unique training resources to seamlessly coordinate fires in support of U.S. and allied operations.

The exercise took place in three locations: the U.S. Army's Grafenwoehr Training Area, Germany; as well as in Riga, Latvia; and Torun, Poland.

other nations, including, Ukraine, Romania, Lithuania, Georgia, the Netherlands, Croatia, Denmark and Azerbaijan.

Their roles were to plan, synchronize, coordinate, and direct fire from six nations with additional surveillance and target acquisition and air defense assets.

53d TC's Digital Liaison Detachment (DLD) teamed up with a contingent from the 4 Regt. (Canadian Army), who exercised command and control over live fire artillery missions in Germany, to form the 453d Multi-National Division Artillery Headquarters (453 MN DIVARTY).

The headquarters also incorporated staff from

Artillery Systems Cooperating Activities which is the common language for Division Artillery organizations across the NATO federated mission network," said Colonel Patrick Macklin, Commanding Officer of the 53d DLD.

The exercise involved about 100 artillery systems from participating countries.
